



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Description

The IRF6716MPbF combines the latest HEXFET® Power MOSFET Silicon technology with the advanced DirectFET™ packaging to achieve the lowest on-state resistance in a package that has the footprint of a SO-8 and only 0.6 mm profile. The DirectFET package is compatible with existing layout geometries used in power applications, PCB assembly equipment and vapor phase, infra-red or convection soldering techniques, when application note AN-1035 is followed regarding the manufacturing methods and processes. The DirectFET package allows dual sided cooling to maximize thermal transfer in power systems, improving previous best thermal resistance by 80%.

The IRF6716MPbF balances both low resistance and low charge along with ultra low package inductance to reduce both conduction and switching losses. The reduced total losses make this product ideal for high efficiency DC-DC converters that power the latest generation of processors operating at higher frequencies. The IRF6716MPbF has been optimized for parameters that are critical in synchronous buck including R_{ds(on)}, gate charge and C_{dV/dt}-induced turn on immunity. The IRF6716MPbF offers particularly low R_{ds(on)} and high C_{dV/dt} immunity for synchronous FET applications.




Fig 1. Typical On-Resistance vs. Gate Voltage





Fig 2. Typical Total Gate Charge vs Gate-to-Source Voltage





Fig 3. Maximum Effective Transient Thermal Impedance, Junction-to-Ambient ①





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


Fig 4. Typical Output Characteristics




Fig 5. Typical Output Characteristics




Fig 6. Typical Transfer Characteristics




Fig 7. Normalized On-Resistance vs. Temperature




Fig 8. Typical Capacitance vs. Drain-to-Source Voltage




Fig 9. Typical On-Resistance vs. Drain Current and Gate Voltage




Fig 10. Typical Source-Drain Diode Forward Voltage




Fig 11. Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig 12. Maximum Drain Current vs. Case Temperature




Fig 13. Typical Threshold Voltage vs. Junction Temperature




Fig 14. Maximum Avalanche Energy vs. Drain Current




Fig 15a. Gate Charge Test Circuit




Fig 15b. Gate Charge Waveform




Fig 16a. Unclamped Inductive Test Circuit




Fig 16b. Unclamped Inductive Waveforms




Fig 17a. Switching Time Test Circuit




Fig 17b. Switching Time Waveforms





Fig 18. Diode Reverse Recovery Test Circuit for N-Channel HEXFET® Power MOSFETs





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


DirectFET™ Part Marking



DirectFET™ Tape & Reel Dimension (Showing component orientation).
